





**Glug Glug to the Bottom of the Sea?**


- whales, turtles and jellyfish

## SINGING and MAKING and PLAYING together.


**Make and Fly a kite.** There are so many ideas online for making kites, simple to more complicated. We've found some and put them on our Pinterest page.

**Make up a picnic.** If it's too cold to eat outside you can always have a picnic by laying a blanket on the floor and getting out all of the soft toys to join you.






## CLAPPING GAMES

Try adapting this song to a clapping game. Clapping games encourage children to keep to the beat, work together and improvise.

Clap and pat for the beginning of the song and then do an action for each of the activities. Make up your own actions or...  
kite flying (hands in the air), building a snowman (one hand on top of the other), puddles (stamp feet) and picnic (hands to mouth to eat)

When you 'clap your hands and shout hooray' you could change the clapping pattern, just patting each other hands and drawing a circle whilst touching your partners hands

## SING AND DRAW
